He also holds certifications in the pedagogical approaches of Paul Rolland, George Bornoff, and Shin'ichi Suzuki. A published researcher, Dr. Dakon's work in string pedagogy, community music, and the history of string education in American public-school systems can be read in the Journal of Research in Music Education, British Journal of Music Education, Journal of Historical Research in Music Education, String Research Journal, Bulletin of the Council for Research in Music Education, and the American String Teacher. He also remains engaged as a clinician, conductor, and performer in orchestral and educational settings throughout Kansas and beyond. Dr. Dakon holds a Ph.D. in Music Education from The Ohio State University, Master of Music in Violin Performance from Appalachian State University, and a Bachelor of Music in Music Education from the University of South Carolina.

Rachel Unruh is in her 9th year teaching orchestra at Haysville West Middle School and assisting 5th grade strings in the Haysville USD261 school district. A Newton native, she discovered the violin in middle school and knew early on that string education was in her future. She credits her love for the profession to the many Kansas string educators who taught and inspired her along the way, and strives to share that joy with her students every day. Unruh is an active player and former board member with the Newton Mid-Kansas Symphony Orchestra. She holds an MME in Instrumental Music from Wichita State University and a BA in Music Education from Bethel College.


# Check Out KASTA's New Website!

## 2022 Summer String Workshop & Middle School Orchestra

f you are a string teacher at any level, be sure to set aside June 17th-18th, 2022, for an amazing professional learning opportunity. This Lyear, the KASTA Summer String Teacher Workshop will include an opportunity for your middle school students to play in an orchestra under the direction of Dr. Mark Laycock, Director of Orchestras at Wichita State University and director of the Wichita Youth Symphony Orchestra.

Our clinician for the Teacher Workshop this year is Jim Palmer. Recipient of the Elizabeth A.H. Green Award for a distinguished career in string teaching, James (Jim) Palmer is an editor, arranger, and featured clinician for Alfred Music. He is also the Orchestra Director and Fine Arts Department Chairman at Allatoona High School in Acworth, Georgia. Mr. Palmer has held posts with youth orchestras throughout Florida and Georgia and is in demand as a clinician presenting workshops at the state level as well as the National ASTA conference. He is dynamic, creative and a master teacher! Teachers

attending his workshop will find an abundance of ideas that they will be able to incorporate immediately into the classroom. You do not need to be a member to attend.

Topics at the summer workshop will include:

- 1. An Alfred sponsored reading session,
- 2. Warm Up to Wrap Up: A Complete Creative Approach to Achieving Excellence in the Orchestra Classroom,
- 3. Orchestral Bowings: Connecting the Technical with the Expressive to Achieve Superior Performances,
- 4. Simple Symphony: A Teacher's Guide to Creating, Rehearsing, and Developing a Symphony Orchestra at your School, and
- 5. Fantastic Fiddling: Understanding how to create a dynamic group that will serve your students and your community.

While teachers are busy learning and adding to their toolboxes, the student orchestra will have a one-day event on Friday, June 17. Students will rehearse and then perform for parents in a side-by-side orchestra with their teachers. The schedule for the students on June 17th is:

- 9:00-10:30 a.m. Orchestra session #1
- 10:45-12:00 a.m. Orchestra session #2
- 12:00-1:30 p.m. Lunch on your own
- 1:30- 2:45p.m. Orchestra session #3
- 3:00 p.m. Rehearsal with attending teachers from KASTA workshops
- 4:00 p.m. Concert for parents

Student cost is \$12 per student. The fee for the two-day teacher workshop is \$150 with a \$25 discount for ASTA members. High school and college students may attend both days for only \$25 and there is an option for single day registration for teachers as well at \$75.

# Rising to Meet Demands: A New Summer Music Festival Opens

ansas has summer classical music festivals, but none that show up easily on search engines, and none that out-of-staters stop and ask me about when I travel. That will change. Leopold Auer Music Festival, a nascent summer music camp for strings and piano students located in Prairie Village, Kansas, is generating excitement around its inaugural season. With students already committed from several states, the festival aims to turn heads around the country for those looking for summer music study in the Midwest.

Growing up a string student in Kansas, I have always felt a need for another strings music festival for dedicated students. Options have been surprisingly limited for a state with such a rich tradition of string playing, a tradition we are all proud of. Too often we are a pipeline for other string programs around the country, when we should be a destination. It is this belief that drove me to found Leopold Auer Music Festival. NOTICE: Kansas students do not need to travel out of state to attain the highest level of string eduction.

At LAMF, you can expect private lessons, numerous solo performance opportunities, masterclasses, chamber music, orchestra, group classes in music history and musicianship, and a concerto competition. After practicing, students can explore Prairie Village with its rich character and tradition: local shops, boutiques, eateries... and maybe even some barbecue. Our dates this year are July 8-16. We provide a music festival without the weeks-long demands that end in exhausted — rather than energized — students. The 9-day schedule allows families to travel together and make an extended vacation out of it.

I am proud to be in the teaching tree of Leopold Auer, teacher of legends like Jascha Heifetz, Mischa Elman, Efrem Zimbalist, and Nathan Milstein. All of us at LAMF dedicate ourselves daily to the standard of teaching and artistry of our namesake. But this does not make us exclusive: we accept students of all ages and abilities. The importance of teaching beginners cannot be overstated; every building needs a foundation, and without proper attention to fundamentals, students face limitations in how they can express themselves. For this reason we are pleased to introduce a beginners program in addition to our advanced program. The playing diversity of our student population forms a symbiotic atmosphere: beginners feel inspired by more advanced players, and more advanced players grow from mentoring beginners. Resulting relationships are why students and parents feel our festival is a family.

We are humbled and grateful to our many supporters who have allowed us to offer need-based scholarships.
