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Echoes from Orchestras Past: Orchestra History Needs to be Recorded

In 2013, we find ourselves 123 years into Kansas' school orchestra history. The first half of that century of orchestras has been documented, but to this writer's knowledge, little of the past 50 years is more than the memories of those musicians and directors who have lived it.

Fifty years ago Olathe was a small town with no orchestra - look at it today. Basehor, Maize, Gardner, Spring Hill, Tecumseh, Stillwell and Stanley were all small towns, but today are hubs of large school districts; and all have orchestras. Who is writing those histories? If orchestra histories are not written, they will be lost in the swirl of social networks and old memories. Your own teaching history could be lost.

Writing the history of Kansas orchestras, or of a community orchestra history, are great subjects for thesis writing or dissertations. Many masters' and doctoral papers are written to never see the light of day again. Histories of Kansas school orchestras will be read and remembered for generations, especially since Kansas has always been a leader in music education. Histories also easily answer the "So what?" question that stymies so many graduate students in choosing a research topic.

Even if you are not writing a graduate paper, now is the time to share your favorite memory of a teacher or history-making event in your orchestra experience. Don't be afraid to toot your own horn. Other teachers need to hear of school orchestra successes.



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KASTA State Solo Competition Details

THE KANSAS CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN STRING TEACHERS ASSOCATION IS PROUD TO PRESENT THE 2013-14 STATE SOLO COMPETITION

The state solo competition has moved to a radically different format this year! We are excited about the changes and are hopeful they will lead to increased participation and involvement!

WHAT:

The KASTA State Solo Competition seeks to recognize exceptional talent in our state at two levels: the JR division (applicants must be enrolled in a K-12 school program) and the SR division (applicants must be enrolled in a college/university at any level, undergraduate or graduate).

WHEN/WHERE:

The competition will take place Thursday, February 27, 2014, from 530pm-715pm at the Century II convention center in Wichita, KS, as part of the 2014 KSMEA In-Service Workshop. All auditions will be LIVE (not taped, as in previous years). A box dinner will be provided to all students who are auditioning for this competition, courtesy of KASTA.

PRIZES:

One JR and one SR division winner will be selected. Both winners will be required to perform on Friday, February 28, 2014, at noon at the annual KASTA awards luncheon at KMEA at the Century II convention center. The JR division winner will be awarded a \$350 prize and the SR division winner will be awarded a \$500 prize from KASTA.

STIPULATIONS:

- 1. Send the application form (via email or postal mail) and \$10 entry fee (check (made out to KASTA) or cash) to state competition chair Matt Means (mmeans@fhsu.edu) by FEBRUARY 1, 2014.
- Once the applicant form and fee have been received applicants will be notified with a specific audition time and room location via email.
- 2. Past state solo competition winners are not eligible to apply.
- 3. REPERTOIRE REQUIREMENTS:
- All applicants are expected to memorize their music, regardless of the division, with the following exceptions:
- -Duo sonata repertoire with piano
- -Chamber ensemble repertoire

All applicants are required to perform as much of their piece as is possible. Accordingly, please do not choose a piece that lasts significantly longer than the time allotment.

JR DIVISION: Applicants for the JR division are expected to prepare a maximum of FIVE (5) minutes of music from ONE (1) piece. Cuts to orchestral tuttis are permitted. Please time your piece carefully to ensure this limit is followed. Pieces may either be accompanied or written for solo instrument. However, if the piece was written with accompaniment, the applicant is required to bring an accompanist to the competition.

SR DIVISION: Applicants for the SR division are expected to prepare a maximum of TEN (10) minutes of music from ONE (1) or TWO (2) pieces. Cuts to orchestral tuttis are permitted. Please time your piece carefully to ensure this limit is followed. Pieces may either be accompanied or written for solo instrument. However, if the piece was written with accompaniment, the applicant is required to bring an accompanist to the competition.

KASTA State Solo Competition Details, Continued

Chamber ensembles are permitted to enter either division provided that:

- 1. No non-string instruments are used except for the piano.
- 2. The ensemble does not exceed 8 instruments.

Winners of the competition (JR or SR division) will be expected to

perform the piece(s) played at the competition at the KASTA luncheon the following day in their entirety.

All applicants will be required to bring THREE (3) copies of the music (piano reductions are ok, photocopies are ok provided they are destroyed immediately after the competition and/or are available via public domain on IMSLP, cuts should be clearly marked for judges) for the judges to their audition. If the piece performed has accompaniment, the accompaniment score should be submitted so that judges may see both the solo and accompaniment part.

- 4. ACCOMPANISTS: All applicants must bring an accompanist to their audition if the piece performed includes an accompaniment part. Accompanists are expected to perform with the division winners at the KASTA luncheon the following day. Accompanists will NOT be provided by KASTA for the competition.
- 5. AUDITION ENVIRONMENT: The competition will be open to the public so that friends and family members may attend. However, any audience members should maintain silence during performances and are not, UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES, to interact with competition judges during the event.
- 6. JUDGING COMMENTS: Once all applicants have performed all audience members will be expected to leave the room so judges may deliberate in privacy. Judges comment sheets will not be distributed to applicants.
- 7. RESULTS: Competition results will be announced immediately upon the completion of judging deliberation.

HELPFUL HINTS:

- 1. Prepare music that demonstrates your highest level of technical and musical accomplishment <u>with</u> the greatest sense of comfort and ease. I often tell my students before a competition, "you should be ALMOST tired of the piece by the time it is performed in the competition environment."
- 2. Practice performing your piece in disadvantaged environments (too hot/too cold, without warmup, with audience members extremely close, with distractions or loud noises nearby) to develop a sense of greater consistency and stability when performing.
- 3. Record yourself regularly and rate your recording (phrasing, intonation, ensemble, pulse, articulation, etc) several times before you perform to develop a greater objective awareness of your preparedness. Use the spots/places noted from your recording as your practice agenda for the day.
- 4. Perform your music for others (especially music professionals that don't play your instrument) for comments before competing to gain more artistic insight.
- 5. Be psychologically prepared to play either earlier or later than your assigned time in case of last minute cancellations or a late start.


