

News from K-State Strings

String Fling 2020!

Seven orchestras, seven fantastic conductors! With more than 500 5th-9th grade students at the K-State Student Union in January, conductors Manda Deegan, Dr. Laura Eakman

Guest Artist, Violinist Immanuel Abraham

Founder of The Violin Guild on Facebook (the largest social media network for bowed strings), Dr. Immanuel Abraham is making a difference in the string world. Growing up in poverty and only starting free lessons at age 14, his dedication to the path for a career in music is inspiring and an important lesson for students. Dr. Abraham shared his knowledge and talent generously, giving collegiate and precollege master classes, talking to beginning violinists at Manhattan's Community School for the Performing Arts, working with Manhattan High School orchestras, and appearing as soloist with the K-State Orchestra. He performed "Winter," from Vivaldi's Four Seasons, and "Schindler's List" by John Williams on the December concert.





K-State Symphony Orchestra Activities

The theme for this year's orchestra programs has been "Perspectives" and the most recent concert (Feb. 20th) was out of this world! In addition to a performance of Holst's *The Planets*, the concert featured a student concerto competition winner playing Debussy's Rhapsodie for Clarinet and Jesse Montgomery's work Starburst for string orchestra. Montgomery is a Juilliard-trained violinist, two-time Sphinx Competition laureate, and is currently composer-in-residence for the Sphinx Virtuosi. In celebration of the centenary of the 19th Amendment this year, one woman composer has been featured on each orchestra concert during the season. In addition to Montgomery, music by Fanny Mendelssohn, Ingrid Stolzel and Rebecca Clarke have been highlighted. The season's last concert will be on April 30, 7:30 pm in McCain Auditorium. The theme? "Home on the Range." Y'all come!




Faculty News

Rachel Dirks and Cora Cooper are staying busy sharing research and pedagogy, along with their K-State duties. Both presented at KMEA, and both will present at the national ASTA conference in Orlando. As at KMEA, Dirks will present multiple times at ASTA, including her clinic session: "Are you ok? Experiencing and Coping with Adolescent Anxiety and Depression in the Music Classroom," based on her groundbreaking research for her doctoral dissertation. She has also presented on this topic and more at CMEA and TMEA (to a crowd of 500+!) Dirks has received word that her research poster, "The Butterfly Lovers Project: A Study of Cultural Authenticity in the Multicultural Music Education Experience" has been accepted by ISME for their conference in Finland this August.

In Orlando, Cooper will reprise her session, "What to do when it doesn't sound like you want it to: A Practice Flowchart." If you missed it at KMEA or ASTA, let her know if you'd like a free copy! Cooper was very honored to receive the KASTA Distinguished Service Award this year, primarily for her work promoting women composers through the graded anthologies *Violin Music by Women* and *Viola Music by Women*. *Cello Music by Women* is in the works, aided by her colleague's expertise!


Welcome Incoming Students!

On June 21st and 22nd, 2019, KASTA had to priviledge of hosting renowned pedagogue and composer, Bob Phillips, to the 2019 KASTA Summer Workshop. Bob has authored over 21 book series for music instruction, including the ground breaking series of books Fiddlers Philharmonic, Fiddlers Philharmonic Encore!, Jazz Philharmonic, Jazz Philharmonic: Second Set and Latin Philharmonic, the String Explorer method books, Fiddle & Song, and the revolutionary Sound Innovations method series, all published by Alfred Music. He has had over 180 works published for orchestras and bands and is an award-winning ASCAP composer.

The event was held at the Wichita State University School of Music and was attended by string orchestra teachers from all parts of Kansas. Good times were had by all! KASTA Presents: 2020 Summer String Workshop June 19 & 20, 2020 Wichita University

Clinician: Dr. Brenda Brenner Jacobs School of Music, Indiana University



Brenda Brenner is Associate Professor and Chair of the Music Education Department in the Jacobs School of Music. She specializes in string music education, teaching applied violin as well as courses in violin and string pedagogy. She received a BM and BME from Wichita State University, and an MM and DMA in violin performance from the Eastman School of Music. In addition to her appointment to the Music Education Department, she serves as co-director of the IU String Academy, a position she has held since 1993. Her String Academy students are featured in concerts in major venues throughout the United States and have presented tours throughout Europe, Asia and South America. As director of the Fairview Project – a program in which over 120 students in an underserved school are taught violin as part of the curriculum – Brenner researches the cognitive, academic and social outcomes of early instrumental music instruction. A performer of chamber music throughout the United States, Brenner partners with her husband, organist Christopher Young. She also

teaches and conducts at the IU Summer String Academy, and is Assistant Director of the IU Retreat for Professional Violinists and Violists. She is an active international clinician, with recent appearances at the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic, the ASTA National Conferences, and at Music Educators Conferences throughout the United States. Brenner is the Past-President of the American String Teachers Association.

Some of the most important factors that determine success in playing a stringed instrument involve the beginning "set up" stage, which includes establishing a proper playing position and developing free and open muscular motions. Teachers can ensure success for their students by establishing a series of procedures that break down the set up tasks to a sequence of exercises that allow their students to look and sound great!

10:45 AM From Poof to Portato: A Sequence of Bow Strokes

Bowing technique is a crucial foundational skill in string playing that creates good tone quality and forms the basis for musical style. In this session, methods of teaching fundamental bow strokes and bow choreography in group settings from beginning through intermediate levels will be explored. Literature utilizing the various strokes will be presented.

1:45 PM Winning with Warmups Part I

An effective warm up routine that integrates technical and musical elements as a preparation for playing repertoire is a key to successful teaching. Separation of both left and right hand difficulties prior to attempting them within the repertoire is essential. This clinic will examine how to design an effective routine and will present examples of warm-ups using standard repertoire from the string orchestra literature.

Learning music theory concepts deepens students¹ understanding of music. Knowledge of intervals, solfege, chord structure, and musical form strengthen the comprehension of musical style, allows students to contribute intelligently to the musical decision-making process, and perform with more understanding and awareness. Strategies for building practical theoretical skills in the beginning through advanced string classroom through games, musical activities, and improvisation will be presented in this clinic.
