

Transitioning to Virtual Private Lessons Manda Deegan Private Instructor, Salina, KS

In January 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic began to emerge. By March, it had reached global proportions. I moved my entire studio to virtual lessons on March 15th, and started offering supplemental virtual lessons for students who are not regularly in my studio in the middle of that week, which means that two weeks later I have taught nearly 100 online virtual lessons.

The learning curve has been steep.

I have learned a lot about teaching virtually. First, the mute button is your friend, and if not applied liberally to the teaching end of a virtual lesson the student will be constantly distracted while they are playing. Sound on the internet is a one-way street. If you get in the way, your sound will be run over and unrecognizable. Second, technology beyond video conferencing, such as scanning apps and texted pictures of notes on music and virtual whiteboards, can be incredibly helpful in lessons. Students can play along with their teacher, but only if the student's side of the lesson is muted so that they cannot hear the echo of their own playing through the teacher's computer. Students can use their videogame consoles as webcams, and that gives them the opportunity to put their teacher's face on their big screen TVs and then comment about every physical defect which they have never noticed before.

I have also learned a lot about my students. Virtual lessons have enabled me to meet their pets and get



virtual tours of their houses. They are all lonely, and most of them are more excited to talk to a non-parental adult who cares about them than they are to play music. I have learned which of my students can focus on their own and which simply wander out of the frame without a word, leaving me to wonder if their lesson is over. I have learned that little kids are far more acclimated to technology than I could have imagined, and I have learned that older kids are far more adaptable and ready to try new things than I could have hoped.

I have learned a great deal about my studio parents and how wide ranging their attitudes about lessons are. Many of them have reached out to get their kids into a second weekly lesson and several have passed my contact info on to their friends with young musicians at home, because they know this has been a tough financial hit for those of us who are self-employed. A handful of parents, however, have pulled their kids out of lessons because the expense seems unnecessary to them when concerts and contests have been canceled. I have had parents stop by to leave payment in my mailbox or on my front porch with a bouquet of flowers or a box of chocolates, but I have also had parents ask me to decrease the cost of lessons since they are no longer 'worth' as much since they are not in person.

I have learned about myself. I have confirmed that I am terrible at sitting still and that being behind a computer all day is one of the most difficult things I have ever done. I've realized that the only reason I feel young is that I am active and take good care of myself, but that it doesn't take long for a sedentary lifestyle to make me feel every minute of my age and then some. I've learned that the most important part of what I do is connecting with students, and that what I value most isn't teaching music per se, but teaching kids how to be more adaptable human beings, capable of rolling with the punches. In that respect, I am grateful for this unprecedented opportunity to help my students develop those skills while I work on developing them myself!



Robinson Middle School 7th & 8th Grade String Orchestras Gain National Recognition

The Robinson Middle School 7th and 8th Grade String Orchestra recently brought home third place in the Middle School Division 2020 National Orchestra Competition held on March 4-7, 2020 in Orlando, Florida, during the National American String Teachers National Conference. This was the Orchestra's second performance at this prestigious event. Back in 2018, they took second place at the same festival.

To get ready for this trip, members participated in several fundraisers, including a garage sale, school holiday grams, beef sticks, suckers, Subway cards, candy bars, etc. Additionally, there were many outside school rehearsals necessary to prepare the 35-minute concert program. When the trip finally arived, the students were so excited! They flew to Orlando, which for many of them was their first time on an airplane. They stayed at the Disney Port Orleans Resort, and while rehearsing during the week they also visited Disney World.

I would highly recommend auditioning for this event. It was wonderful for the students to push themselves, and to listen to other fine orchestras from around the nation at the Conference. Overall, they had an amazing experience full of lifelong memories! -Laura Hutchins

Kansas State 2020 String News

While 2020 has created a multitude of challenges, the K-State String Division and Symphony Orchestra have had an exciting and action-packed year. As winter drew to a close, both Cora Cooper and Rachel Dirks presented at the KMEA and National ASTA conferences. After students began to shelter in place in March, the KSU Symphony Orchestra musicians worked to create a virtual performance of the school's fight song (Wabash Cannonball), wrapping up a successful season with a dose of school spirit and musical collaboration.

Over the summer, the K-State String Division successfully launched a Master of Music Education program for string educators. Members of the program worked throughout June and July to create video tutorials for teaching low string pedagogy; these videos may be accessed on the K-State Orchestra's String Education Resources page. Team members also designed planning structures to fit their current teaching assignments, whether online, hybrid, or in person.

This school year, the KSUSO has been selected to perform at the KMEA In-Service Workshop and is busily preparing a virtual performance for presentation in February. The orchestra's first concert of the season was presented twice, once in an online format followed by a socially distanced outdoor concert for the K-State and Manhattan community.



Future performances will be available online with another outdoor concert anticipated in April, 2021.

In January, the K-State String Division will host the 48th annual String Fling middle level orchestra festival. Due to safety protocols on campus, this year's festival will be held online. String Fling @ Home will feature an exciting line-up of virtual classes, activities, and games. Registration for the two-day event will be available by mid-November. Please Join Us for the 2021 Summer String Workshop at Wichita University



Brenda Brenner is Associate Professor and Chair of the Music Education Department in the Jacobs School of Music. She specializes in string music education, teaching applied violin as well as courses in violin and string pedagogy. She received a BM and BME from Wichita State University, and an MM and DMA in violin performance from the Eastman School of Music. In addition to her appointment to the Music Education Department, she serves as co-director of the IU String Academy, a position she has held since 1993. Her String Academy students are featured in concerts in major venues throughout the United States and have presented tours throughout Europe, Asia and South America. As director of the Fairview Project – a program in which over 120 students in an underserved school are taught violin as part of the curriculum – Brenner researches the cognitive, academic and social outcomes of early instrumental music instruction. A performer of chamber music throughout the United States, Brenner partners with her husband, organist Christopher Young. She also teaches and conducts at

the IU Summer String Academy, and is Assistant Director of the IU Retreat for Professional Violinists and Violists. She is an active international clinician, with recent appearances at the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic, the ASTA National Conferences, and at Music Educators Conferences throughout the United States. Brenner is the Past-President of the American String Teachers Association.

KASTA Recognizes Outstanding String Educators

KASTA recognized two outstanding music educators at the KASTA luncheon at KMEA in February. This year's award winners included Haley Rotenberger from Garden City USD 475, and Dr. Cora Cooper from Kansas State University.

Haley Rotenberger was awarded this year's KAS-TA Young Teacher of the Year Award. Haley currently holds a position in Garden City USD 457 as the orchestra teacher at Kenneth Henderson Middle School, Charles Stones Intermediate Center, Bernadine Sitts Intermediate Center, Abe Hubert Elementary School, Jennie Barker Elementary School, and Plymel Elementary School. She is the Middle School Orchestra chairperson for SW Kansas, and regularly attends KASTA summer sessions and KMEA. She also makes time to perform in community events as they present themselves. Summer Miller, Garden City HS and Horace Good MS Orchestra Director notes that "the level of the entire program has been improved because of Haley's systematic way of teaching the beginning students. She is an excellent teacher and co-worker. She is organized, reliable and professional." Miller also commented that Haley Rotenberger "goes above and beyond the call of the 'duty day' every day." Congratulations, Haley, and thank you for your excellent contribution to string teaching in Kansas!



Dr. Cora Cooper was awarded the KASTA Distinguished Service Award this year. Dr. Cooper teaches violin, viola, chamber music and string pedagogy at Kanas State University. She studied violin with Peter Salaff, Charles Castleman, Karen Clark and Eliot Chapo, and short-term with Linda Cerone and Simon Fischer. Cooper recorded for NAXOS American Classics and has professional symphony experience playing with the Vermont, Austin and Tallahassee Symphonies, and the Atlanta Baroque Orchestra. Research on music by women composers led to multiple performances at the Festival of Women Composers at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, and lectures in the United States and England. Cooper publishes violin and viola music by women composers and assorted chamber



music editions. Her latest project is a new chamber music series, Developing Contemporary Techniques, with two volumes published in 2018.

Cooper served on the violin committee for two editions of the ASTA String Syllabus, and has been a frequent contributor to the AST Journal. She has presented sessions at the ASTA National Conference three times. Cooper has attended the Starling-De-Lay Symposium on Violin Pedagogy at the Juilliard School, the Teaching Violin to Children workshop, and is certified in the Sassmannshaus Method. She is a member of the founding education committee of the Boulanger Initiative, a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting women composers.

"Dr. Cooper has made extraordinary contributions to the field of string education both in Kansas and around the globe" says Rachel Dirks, Director of Orchestral Studies at Kansas State University. "She is an exemplary instructor who has impacted the lives of countless musicians and music educators."

Thank you for your tremendous work in string education, Dr. Cooper. And congratulations!

Dr. Anne Clark of rural Morganville has been awarded the 2020 Marquis Who's Who Lifetime Achievement Award in Music, an award than goes to only five percent of entries in the registry's Music category. Clark currently teaches Orchestra to grades 2-12 at Green Christian School, which began its fall classes Tuesday, Sept. 8. She also teaches studio lessons at Glenn's Music Store in Manhattan three days a week, and in her home studio one day a week. Since 1997 her LLC, Community Chamber Orchestra , has been giving live concerts using employed youth and adults who play without a conductor.

The CCO orchestra will be performing on the Morganville School stage in a "Nashville" Thanksgiving Concert on Sat., Nov. 21 at 4:00 pm. • The KASTA executive board will meet in December to discuss the possibility of proceeding with plans for the 2021 KASTA Middle Level Orchestra.

Date: Saturday, April 17, 2021

Place: Hutchinson Middle School 8th Grade Attendance Center (Liberty), 14th and Adams, Hutchinson KS

<u>Schedule:</u> 8:00-8:30 Registration; 8:30-10:00 Rehearsal #1; 10:00-10:15 Break; 10:15-11:30 Rehearsal #2; 11:30-1:00 Lunch; 1:00-2:20 Rehearsal #3 3:00 Concert

There will be approximately 84 players; 22 first violins, 22 second violins, 16 violas, 14 cellos, and 10 basses. Selection is based on the teacher recommendation and the review of the "paper audition" forms by the player selection committee. Participation is reserved for 7th, 8th, and 9th graders only by the following system:
