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2022 KASTA State Solo Competition

We're back in person this year! The KASTA State Solo Competition seeks to recognize exceptional string students in Kansas:

- Preparatory Division (Up to Grade 8)
- Junior Division (9th-12th Grade)
- Senior Division (Enrolled undergraduate and graduate college students; 29 years old or younger)

The competition will take place Thursday, February 24th, 2022 (5:00-7:00pm) at the Century II Convention Center in Wichita, KS as part of the KMEA In-Service Workshop.

Prizes

One winner from each division (Preparatory, Junior, and Senior) will be selected. New this year - One overall winner will also be recognized and will perform on Friday, February 25th at the annual KASTA awards luncheon at KMEA.

In addition, the following prizes will be awarded by KASTA;

- Preparatory Division
 - 1st place \$75.00
 - 2nd place \$25.00
- Junior Division
 - o 1st place \$300.00
 - 2nd place \$75.00
- Senior Division
 - o 1st place \$500.00
 - o 2nd place \$75.00

Registration:

Complete the online application available on the KASTA website and mail the \$15.00 entry fee (checks made out to KASTA or cash) to Dr. Amber Peterson (Southwestern College, 100 College St., Winfield, KS 67156). The application deadline is: Friday, January 21st, 2022.

Students will be notified of the competition schedule by February 10th.

<u>Rules:</u>

- 1. Competitors must be current students residing in Kansas.
- 2. Past KASTA State Solo Competition 1st place winners are not eligible to compete again in the division they previously won.
- 3. All competitors are required to memorize their music, regardless of the division, with the following exceptions:
 - Duo sonata repertoire with piano
 - Chamber ensemble repertoire
- 4. If pieces are accompanied, competitors must perform with accompaniment. A staff accompanist will be available if competitors are not able provide their own. Contact Dr. Peterson (amber.peterson@sckans.edu) to reserve the accompanist by January 21st, 2022. The cost will be \$50.00, which includes one 30-minute rehearsal and the competition performance. Payment is due by the day of the competition. If selected as the overall winner, the accompanist used at the competition must be the accompanist used at the luncheon.
- 5. Time limitation -
 - Preparatory Division A maximum of 10 minutes of music from 1 piece
 - Junior Division A maximum of 10 minutes of music from 1 piece
 - Senior Division A maximum of 15 minutes of music from 1 or 2 pieces
- 6. The overall winner across divisions must be available to perform at the KASTA luncheon on Friday, February 25th.
- 7. The competition will be open to the public so that family members and teachers can attend.
- 8. Judges' comments will be given to students within a week of the competition.
- 9. Chamber ensembles are permitted to compete provided that:
 - No non-string instruments are used except for piano.
 - The ensemble does not exceed 8 instruments.
- 10. Competitors are required to bring TWO copies of the music, with measures numbered, for the judges. If the piece is performed with accompaniment, the accompaniment scores should be the copies submitted to the judges.
- 11. Results will be announced immediately upon completion of the judges' deliberation.

Please encourage your students to participate this year as a showcase of the fine string students and teachers we have in Kansas!

Editorial: Changes to the 2022 KMEA All-State Orchestra Schedule

We're looking forward to a great *in-person* convention in Wichita next February. For the first time, we have two All-State Orchestras performing at the convention! This is a great achievement and a very exciting prospect. The clinician for the Full Orchestra will be Jessica Bejarano, conductor of the San Francisco Philharmonic. Literature will be Tchaikovsky's *Marche slave (Slavonic March), Op. 31* and *1812 Overture, Op. 49*. The ensemble will rehearse in the Broadview Hotel just as in previous years. The String Orchestra clinician will be <u>Thomas</u> Taylor Dickey from Oklahoma State University. This group will rehearse in a church about six blocks from the Broadview. Literature will include *Vivid* by Shir Ran Yinon, *Chorale* by Stella Sung, and *String Sinfonia in D Major* by Felix Mendelssohn. Students for the new string orchestra will be chosen by audition in January using the same process and audition repertoire used for the full orchestra.

As with all manners of change, the addition of the new orchestra has created some logistical issues. Not only will our new string orchestra perform, but there will also be a third band for 1A and 2A schools performing as well. Faced with an impossibly long Saturday afternoon performance schedule, the KMEA Executive Board placed the both orchestra performances on Friday evening. This decision was based on the idea that it was easiest for directors who have students in both groups to have them performing back-to-back. The Friday night plan, however, presents a number of issues for us and our constituents:

- 1. Loss of rehearsal time;
- 2. The exhaustion factor, especially for wind players who will have been rehearsing all-day Friday and performing that same evening;
- 3. Loss of the sleep consolidation time that normally occurs between the Friday and Saturday rehearsals;
- 4. Difficulties for working parents to attend the concert on Friday evening; and
- 5. Most importantly, replacing the All-State Orchestra on the Saturday Concert with a newly added, non-audition performing group inadvertently creates the impression that KMEA views the Kansas All-State Full Orchestra, the premier orchestral ensemble and crowning achievement of both band and string students in Kansas, as secondary to the All-State Bands and Choirs, both auditioned and non-auditioned.


In my 40 plus years as a KMEA and KASTA member, I have learned that conflicting opinions are an important part any organization's growth and development; however, the KASTA board strongly believes the new concert schedule should be re-opened for discussion and subsequently reevaluated. KASTA was not consulted before this decision was made by the KMEA Executive Board, and as an advisory body to the KMEA Board, we believe this would have been appropriate. We recommend that KASTA members concerned about this new schedule express their concerns to Executive Director, John Taylor (taylorj@friends.edu) and/or Mark Gard, KMEA President (president@ksmea.org).

Soon Hee Newbold Visits Salina Public Schools

In 2020, Kansas Wesleyan University organized a High School Honor Orchestra experience for Salina South, Salina Central, Smoky Valley, Hutchinson, Goddard, Blue Valley, and Great Bend High Schools. Due to the COVID global pandemic, however, the event was cancelled. Much to everyone's delight, KWU was able to reschedule the event for October 29th and 30th, 2021, bringing in none other than composer Soon Hee Newbold as our clinician! Dr. Leonardo Rosario from Kansas Wesleyan spearheaded the experience, coordinating it so that Newbold would not just conduct the High School Honors Orchestra, but also clinic local middle school orchestra classes in Salina. On Friday, October 29th, Newbold visited South and Lakewood Middle School's 8th-grade orchestras working with and facilitating great conversations with the students. At the end of the clinics, Newbold graciously provided our starstruck students with photos and autographs. She also hosted a master class with high school students and a held a virtual master class with students in Brazil!

The High School Honors Orchestra occured the following day on Saturday, October 30th. Eight students from each of the seven high schools were selected to participate. Participants got the opportunity to work on music written by Newbold, as well as two other pieces rehearsed by Dr. Rosario. The directors also got a one-on-one session with Newbold where we asked questions and just talked about how the pandemic had affected us. 

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Save the Date! Bornoff String Workshop Sunday, July 10 - Saturday July 16, 2022 Murphy Hall University of Kansas, Lawrence




